

Scandinavia	A group of countries in northern Europe that includes Norway, Denmark and Sweden.		
fjord	A strip of sea that comes into the land between high cliffs, especially in Norway.

biomes	A major ecological community, extending over a large area and usually characterized by a dominant vegetation.		
climate	The climate of a place is the general weather conditions that are typical of it.		
currency	The money used in a particular country is referred to as its currency.		
region	A large area of land that is different from other areas of land, for example, because it is one of the different parts of a country with its own customs and characteristics or because it has a particular geographical feature.		
latitude	The latitude of a place is its distance from the equator.	<p style="text-align: center;">Misconceptions and Facts</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Vikings sent their armies on longboats to other countries, including Britain and Ireland to take over some of the land. • Vikings travelled much further than Britain. In fact, a Viking called Leif Erikson sailed all the way to North America. He is the first known European to set foot in America, 500 years before Christopher Columbus got there. 	
longitude	The longitude of a place is its distance to the west or east of a line passing through Greenwich.		
equator	An imaginary line around the middle of the Earth at an equal distance from the North pole and the South pole,
